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INTRODUCTION

The School Breakfast Program (SBP) is a federally assisted meal program operating in more than 72,000 schools and institutions nationwide. The program was established under the Child Nutrition Act of 1966 to ensure that all children have access to a healthy breakfast at school to promote learning readiness and healthy eating behaviors. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free breakfasts to 7.8 million children each school day. The program is designed to provide 25% of a child's dietary needs, and more importantly can fill an important nutrition gap for hungry children. In addition to these health benefits, recent research from around the nation links participation in the School Breakfast Program with improved academic success. Studies show that children who eat breakfast at school--regardless of their family income level--have higher test scores, are less tardy and absent, have fewer visits to the school nurse, and better behavior than those who do not eat breakfast.

Unlike many education reforms that come with high price tags, school breakfast is a low cost resource that California should promote to support learning and increase the health and well being of our children. School districts receive federal and state funds for every meal served that meets United States Department of Agriculture requirements. During the 2000-2001 school year California received nearly \$200 million in federal reimbursement through the School Breakfast Program.¹

With one of the highest rates of poverty among children in the country, California's education system cannot ignore a basic barrier to learning; hunger. There are currently 2.8 million children in California qualified for free or reduced price school meals. These children come from families living at or below 185% of the federal poverty level.² Unfortunately, in 2001 only 41% of low income children who ate lunch at school also ate breakfast.³ A recent report by the Food Research and Action Center ranked California 25th in the nation for participation in the School Breakfast Program among low income children. Rather than leading the country, California lags far behind top performers such as West Virginia, Kentucky, Arkansas, and Oregon. These states are currently feeding more than 55% of all of their low income students. If California were to meet this benchmark, an additional 250,000 low income children would receive the benefits of school breakfast.

California can meet this goal through two strategies: starting new programs and expanding existing programs. The first strategy is to make breakfast available in all schools that have significant numbers of low income students. Twenty-three states in the country have made this commitment by passing school breakfast mandates. In doing so, these states passed laws to guarantee that needy students have access to school breakfast. California has yet to make such a commitment.

The second strategy is to expand existing programs. By using state start-up and expansion grants and replicating the best practices from other places, schools can increase school breakfast participation with limited expense and effort. For example, schools can serve breakfast in the classroom, offer foods that children request through surveys, and promote breakfast through monthly contests.

Furthermore, in 2002 California has the opportunity to expand the School Breakfast Program and thereby help children succeed at school, by enacting Assemblymember Jackie Goldberg's AB 2395 *Feeding Hunger Minds in Low Performing Schools Initiative*. The bill would require very low performing schools to offer school breakfast.

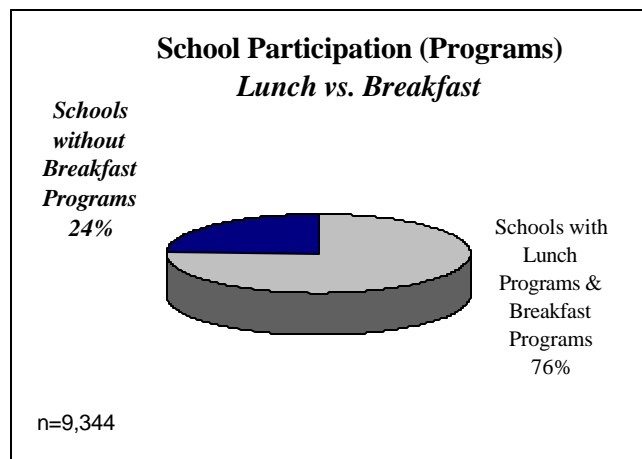

INCREASING ACCESS: STARTING NEW PROGRAMS

In California, before a child can choose to eat breakfast, schools must choose to offer the program. Though 76% of schools in California offer school breakfast, the 24% of schools that do not offer breakfast represent over two thousand schools.⁴ At least 145,000 children, qualified for free or reduce price meals, attend these schools.⁵ Over 98,000 of these children attend schools that qualify for state funding to start a School Breakfast Program.

When comparing the percentage of schools offering breakfast out of the number offering lunch, California ranks 30th in the nation. There are 15 states currently offering school breakfast in 90% or more of their schools that offer lunch.



Barriers and Solutions

Over seventy-five percent of schools in California have found that serving breakfast is feasible and in some cases can help support the school lunch program. Common barriers to starting new school breakfast programs include: lack of support from school administrators; inadequate time to serve a morning meal before school or during a morning recess; fear that low participation will make the program financially unviable; and inadequate staff resources to supervise children. These barriers are similar to those identified by districts around the state and throughout the country. Yet, thousands of schools have overcome these barriers. Schools have made breakfast a priority by:

- ☺ Encouraging staff to make breakfast work through minor schedule changes.
- ☺ Adjusting bus schedules by a few minutes.
- ☺ Serving bagged breakfasts at recess or in the classroom.
- ☺ Asking parent volunteers to help supervise children while they eat.

Resources for New Programs: Start Up Grants

In California, any school with 20% or more children who are qualified for free or reduced price school meals is eligible to receive up to \$15,000 to help start a new breakfast program. Since the early 90s, California has invested \$10 million to help nearly 1,000 schools start new programs. The start up grants help schools purchase “breakfast bars”, carts to bring meals to the classroom, staff training, and outreach materials to promote new programs.

In 2000-2001, California awarded \$155,000 to 18 new school breakfast programs in 12 school districts. An estimated 3,200 children are eating breakfast at these schools everyday.

Riverbank Unified School District (Sonoma County) received two start-up grants (Rio Attura School and California Ave. School). Without the start-up grants the district would not have been able to start breakfast programs at the two schools. The district purchased serving carts, tables, serving utensils, and reach-in refrigerators.

Elk Grove Unified School District (Sacramento County) received a start-up grant for Isabelle Jackson Elementary School after a request was made from the school’s principal to the district’s Food Service Director. With the support of parents, custodial staff, and cafeteria staff, the school began serving breakfast in September of 2001. The start-up grant helped purchase serving tables, milk coolers, and a computer. Average Daily Participation: 300

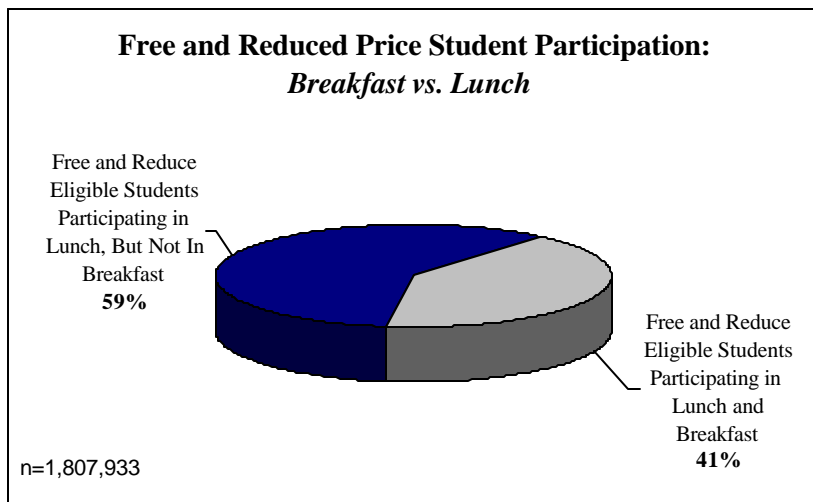

INCREASING PARTICIPATION: EXPANDING EXISTING BREAKFAST PROGRAMS

Once children have access to breakfast at school, the next goal is to maximize participation. In 2001, approximately 1.8 million low income children received school lunch, but only 41% of them received breakfast.⁷ It is reasonable for schools to aim for at least 50% participation by students eligible for free and reduced price meals. With a little bit of creativity and support among school staff, many schools in California are feeding over 70% of their low income students. When children eat at school, they are better able to learn.



According to the Food Research and Action Center, there are currently eleven states in the country serving school breakfast to 50% or more of the free and reduced eligible students participating in the National School Lunch Program.

The Barriers and Solutions

In a recent survey conducted by CFPA with Food Service Directors operating new School Breakfast Programs, several barriers to increasing participation were identified.⁸ The main barriers had to do with – time, budget constraints, social issues, and lack of interest. Often, time is an issue because students arrive just before class starts, parents do not want to get to school earlier, and there is not enough time to eat with lines and the short time allocated. Further, menus are limited due to time and personnel constraints and the need to provide supervision that can't be covered with the budget. Social issues also play a role in keeping participation low – there is more stigma attached to breakfast as all children eat lunch at school and the cafeteria may be isolated from where kids hang out. Finally, there is often a lack of student interest in the program.

Even so, many districts are expanding school breakfast participation with creative, low cost solutions. For example:

- ☺ Feed children “breakfast in a bag” on the bus.
- ☺ Survey students twice a year to find out what foods they like to eat.
- ☺ Offer breakfast in the classroom or during morning recess.

Resources for Increasing Breakfast Participation

Provision 2. Provisions 2 & 3 are streamlining options that allow schools to offer free meals to all students under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program (NSLP and SBP). The options work best with schools that have at least 85% free and reduce price meal eligibility. Schools operating under the options usually experience a dramatic increase in SBP participation.

Pleasant View Elementary School District (Tulare County) Every student at Pleasant View Elementary qualifies for free breakfast and lunch under the Provision 2. Of the 530 students 93% participate in school lunch and 85% participate in the school breakfast program. One key to this school's success is that the vast majority of students are bused to school every day. Buses drop the kids off at the cafeteria where everyone is given breakfast. Parents, including many fathers, often accompany their children to school to make sure that they are eating their breakfasts. In addition, the school provides incentives to encourage children to participate and eat the meals. Students who participate for one full month are treated to a pizza party and those who participate for one year get a trip to the water slides. There is strong support from school staff including the principal and reading teacher who assist with the School Breakfast Program every morning. *Average Daily Participation: 450*

Expansion Grants. Any school in the state of California with more than 20% of children qualified for free or reduced price school meals is eligible to receive up to \$15,000 to help expand an existing breakfast programs. Expansion grants have helped schools promote their program, as well as purchase equipment. In 2000-2001, 93 schools in 23 districts received over \$690,000 from the State of California to help expand school breakfast for 30,000 children.

Culver City Unified School District (Los Angeles County) was able to expand the number of children fed at three breakfast program sites by purchasing new software and key pads to help increase their speed of service. In addition to upgrading technology, each cafeteria was given “One World Café” marketing kits to help update the appearance of the cafeterias. *Average Daily Participation (3 sites): 510*

Universal Breakfast Pilot Project: *Santa Rosa City School District.* Thanks to legislation by Congresswoman Lynn Woolsey, USDA is currently studying the impact of SBP participation on nutrition, learning, and school attendance in schools when breakfasts are provided free to all students. Santa Rosa City School District is one of six districts in the country taking part in the project. In each district, half the schools are continuing to operate the regular school breakfast program and half are implementing a universal feeding program. For Santa Rosa this means five schools are serving all children free breakfast and five are serving under the traditional breakfast program guidelines. An interim report on the project is to be released in Spring 2002 and the final report will be done by summer 2004.

Recommendations

State Legislators

- ✓ **Support the Feeding Hungry Minds in Low Performing Schools Bill** (Author Assemblymember Jackie Goldberg). In 2002, California has an opportunity to reduce the number of children who face school each day without enough food to feed their bodies and minds. No new funding is needed, as the funding is already there to help schools start or expand their programs. California must commit to giving children all the resources available to help them learn; breakfast is one of the easiest to provide. The first step in this commitment is for the Legislature to pass the Feeding Hungry Minds in Low Performing Schools initiative. The legislation would bring school breakfast into 70 of the lowest performing schools in the state. More information is available at www.cfpa.net.
- ✓ **Support State Funding to Help New and Expanding Programs.** Protect school breakfast start-up and expansion grant funding, and support increased investment in the future. The Governor has included \$1million in the California Department of Education's budget for start-up and expansion grants. In future years, this funding allocation should be increased to provide every school in the state with support for new and expanding school breakfast programs.

State Administrators

- ✓ **Promote School Breakfast Start-Up and Expansion Grants** on California Department of Education's (CDE) website and at conferences.
- ✓ **Contact all new school breakfast programs and offer technical support** to make sure new programs are financially secure from the beginning. Maintain such contact throughout the first year.
- ✓ **Offer workshops on ways to increase participation in school breakfast** at CDE's annual fall trainings for district administrators. Topics should include ways to improve meal quality, how to serve breakfast in the classroom or at recess, and ideas on low cost promotional events.
- ✓ **Increase online resources to help districts promote their programs** and post best practices from around the state on CDE's website.

School District Business Officials/Food Service Staff

- ✓ **Apply for start-up and expansion grants.**
- ✓ **Get principals on board.** Host a meeting with school principals to discuss ways to improve the school meal programs and to reinforce the importance breakfast has on learning
- ✓ **Use CDE to help you start your program off right.** Contact your California Department of Education regional contact if you think any of your sites may be losing money on breakfast.
- ✓ **Feed every child for free in needy communities.** Schools should use the Provision 2 option in schools with more than 85% free and reduced price students.
- ✓ **Share best practices with other districts.**

Local Advocates

- ✓ **Identify your community's breakfast needs** by using the County Participation table on page 9 of this guide and the District Programs table on page 12. The California Department of Education does not collect site level participation data, so if you would like this data please call your school district and request the "average daily participation" for school breakfast at specific schools.
- ✓ **Visit school breakfast programs in your community** or volunteer to help supervise children while they eat.
- ✓ **Promote school breakfast to families who qualify for free or reduce meals through word of mouth, flyers, or posters.** Always promote school breakfast as a program that feeds children's bodies and minds.
- ✓ **Contact your state legislators and ask for their support of the *Feeding Hungry Minds in Low Performing Schools Initiative*.** The legislation would bring school breakfast into 70 of the lowest performing schools in the state.
- ✓ **Support schools and district that are using innovative strategies to feed kids by publicizing their efforts.**

Appendix B: CFPA' s School Breakfast Start-Up Grant Survey Report

California Food Policy Advocates School Breakfast Program Start-Up Grant Report *Allison DeMarco, March 2002*

California Food Policy Advocates conducted a survey of School Breakfast Program start-up grant recipient school districts between 1998 and 2000. Of the 17 grantees 8 are represented in this report. The survey's objective was to determine how school districts have used start-up funds and how those funds have impacted student participation. Respondents were asked about how their districts learned about the start-up grant, what the application process was like, how the grant was used, barriers to participation, and level of student participation.

Section I: Demographics

School Breakfast Program surveys were completed by district accountants, superintendents, food service directors, and cafeteria clerks. These individuals have been in their positions for an average of 10 years (range 1 year to 26 years). They represent a variety of school districts – in size and geographic location. Three school districts consisted of only 1 school (elementary) with total enrollment ranging from 148 (Browns School District in Sutter County) to 530 (Pleasant View Elementary School District in Tulare County). Other school districts include elementary, middle and high schools with much higher enrollments (up to 24,915 in Hayward School District). These school districts operate an average of 4.6 School Breakfast Programs (range 1 to 14 programs). Only one district (Hayward) implemented a breakfast program without start-up funding. The district had existing and sufficient equipment and were concerned about the three-year minimum with the start-up grant.

Section II: Grant Marketing

Respondents learned about the School Breakfast start-up grants through the CDE Website, the CDE Annual Training Conference, CDE flyers, other conferences, word of mouth from other local districts, from CFPA Staff, a Local Food Service Cooperative, and State mailing packet.

District personnel were asked about other ways that the CDE could promote the start-up grant. Some of these responses included: School Services of California notices, CASBO & ACSA, and promoting the program to principals, administrators, board members, and teachers at meetings and in bulletins. Individuals also reported that the Department of Education has done a good job publicizing the program, specifically noting the flyer sent every 6 months about School Breakfast Program. Most districts obtained grant applications by requesting them from the CDE. Others utilized the CDE Website and the CFPA Website.

Section III: Application Process

The applications were completed by various personnel within the districts. These included: the district accountant, the superintendent, the food service director, and the principal. Most respondents felt that the application process was straightforward and easy to complete. Some reported that the application was very detailed, necessitating the gathering of information fully before applying as the information requested was very specific.

Most respondents reported that the application took no more than a few hours to complete. However, a few others described the process as taking two days to one month or so to complete, especially when applying for more than one grant. According to one food service director the biggest part was getting bids and figuring out what they were allowed to apply for. Each site reported knowing whom to contact at the Department of Education to answer questions.

In general respondents reported that award responses either came quickly (“almost immediately”) or took a long time (“several months – the application sat on someone’s desk for several months”). A few stated that they had to call

several times before given approval. In one case written approval came 2-3 months after the grant was completely spent.

Section IV: Grant Use

When asked if the award amount was appropriate the majority responded that the amount was sufficient, but, of course, they could have used more. Others responded that it was enough to get them where they needed to be (“We used it wisely – it was an appropriate amount”). Another reported that they would have liked more funding to temporarily employ a marketing specialist to promote the program and provide training. Everyone reported that they spent the grant as they had expected to.

For the most part, grants were spent on equipment, ranging from large items, a new truck, warming ovens, refrigerators and freezers, milk coolers, transport and serving carts, and smaller items, tables, pans, serving and cooking utensils, toasters, microwaves, and mixers.

A few school districts made other purchases to set up their program. One site described needing to upgrade their area to meet county-code, adding vinyl flooring and tile, another added a sink. One site bought T-shirts for staff to wear to promote the program, while another had to demolish their dish room to make room for the new equipment.

Responders were given a scale from 1-3 and asked to rate how essential the grant was to starting the program (#1=Without the grant we would not have started the program, #3= The grant was helpful, but not necessary to starting the program). Three selected #1, one selected #2, and four selected #3. Clearly, people felt this was an important community need and would have tried to provide it without dedicated funding. The majority responded that they had received their total grant allocation. Answers varied about the length of time that elapsed before the funds were received. These answers included: almost one year later, very quick, it took a few months to receive the money and had to call a few times, the money didn’t come for quite some time – we had to pull money from the general fund and then reimburse it.

Section V: Participation

Total School District Enrollment for these eight sites, as of October 1, 2001, ranged from 156 to 24,915 (mean = 6,411). One small school district (Pleasant View in Tulare County) utilizes Provision 2 so that all 530 students are eligible for free breakfast and lunch. Their participation is very high – 85% for breakfast and 94% for lunch. Most of the other districts had somewhat lower participation across the board, even with high eligibility and all districts served more lunches than breakfasts. Furthermore, for the most part, participation levels have increased or remained constant since the first year of the grant.

Food Service Directors listed several barriers to higher participation in the School Breakfast Program. These seemed to revolve around some main themes – time, budget constraints, social issues, and lack of interest. Often, time is an issue because students arrive just before class starts, parents don’t want to get to school earlier, and there is not enough time to eat with lines and the short time allocated. Further, menus are limited due to time and personnel constraints and the need to provide supervision that can’t be covered with the budget. Social issues also play a role in keeping participation low – there is more stigma attached to breakfast as all children eat lunch at school and the cafeteria may be isolated from where kids hang out. Finally, there is often a lack of student interest in the program.

Section VI: Future Funding Needs

In terms of creating a successful program directors reported a variety of additional needs. These include: concerns about increasing population, desire for a larger kitchen facility, a warming oven needed so all breakfasts can be served hot, increased marketing, and nutrition education in the classroom to discuss why breakfast is important.

Respondents also described how the State could better support the School Breakfast Program. While most felt that the state was supportive, ideas that were generated included: ways to increase student interest (one site shows cartoons during breakfast), give larger grants - \$10,000 is small even in a small school, more reimbursement funds per meal served,

create color posters to support the program, allow groups of districts in the same area to send in combined grants for at least 3 years, and provide a nutrition specialist who can also market the breakfast program.

One site recommended visiting other successful schools while developing a new program. Another reported that the SBP is a good thing that they want to do for the community even though it cuts into funding. There is also some uncertainty about what Governor Davis' budget will cover. Another director recommended that, with the focus on increased test scores and attendance, ideas to integrate breakfast into the first 15 minutes of classroom work should be developed.
